


#### **Our Values**

#### **Child Protection**

National Development Foundation works and collaborates with various Government and non-government stakeholders in creating a protective environment for children free from all forms of violence, abuse, exploitation, and neglect; strengthening community-based child protection mechanisms through effective implementation of child protection policies, legislation, services, and schemes; advocating and influencing legal and policy reforms in line with Global Conventions on the Rights of the Child ratified by Govt. of India in the state of J&K; and utilizing a child rights programming framework keeping in mind the cross-cutting themes of child participation, non-discrimination and best interest of children while working with and for children for the realisation of their Rights.

We are strengthening health systems and nutrition services for all children and women, effectively implementing health/medical schemes, preventing child marriage and reducing adolescent pregnancies, and providing infrastructure and health services to improve the health status of communities.

#### Education

National Development Foundation, NDF collaborate with various Government and non-governmental stakeholders and works towards ensuring every child, especially the most marginalised those in greater danger of being left behind like girls and children with disabilities, enjoy their right to equitable and quality Education from early learning opportunities to secondary Education so that they reach their full potential; work for effective implementation of education policies, legislations, schemes and services; strengthening policy and legal reforms in line with the right to Education and providing infrastructure to improve education services.

## Water Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH)

National Development Foundation, NDF aims to improve general public health and transform the lives of communities by improving their access to safe Water, sanitation and hygiene; work and build partnerships with Government and non-governmental stakeholders to empower and enable communities to demonstrate sustainable WASH solutions to influence policy; improve access to water supply by leveraging government resources; construct toilets to stop open defecation for universal toilet use at households, school, institutions, and public places; improve hygiene practices by promoting knowledge and motivating change on main hygiene behaviours; strengthening linkages between government WASH facilities/schemes and communities, and promote safe waste management and disposal.

In the aftermath of natural disasters, work and collaborate with Government and non-governmental stakeholders to reach out to the most marginalised & needy families affected by natural disasters to respond to their immediate essential needs and long-term rehabilitation; to promote and build leadership among children, youth, and women through community-based approaches enabling them to participate in the decision-making process to respond effectively to humanitarian crises; and provide child-friendly spaces to cater to the children's psychological, nutritional, medical and protection needs.

#### Nature, Wildlife and Climate Change

#### • Himalayan Wildlife and Environment Protection

National Development Foundation, NDF aims to work with a wide range of stakeholders to conserve and protect Himalayan Wildlife and critical ecosystems for continued social, economic and environmental benefits. This NDF programme focuses on environmental protection, conservation. and awareness-building partnerships Government, research institutions, educational institutions, and civil society organisations. NDF aims to effective implementation of environment & wildlife-related policies & legislation. To achieve the overall objectives of nature and wildlife conservation, we aim to work closely with communities, as well as several leading scientists, conservationists, educators, and experts from varied professional backgrounds with a passion for the conservation of nature and natural resources. As part of this programme, the focal area of our work will be Northern India in general and the Western Himalayas in particular. Ecotourism initiatives in natural areas and key wildlife habitats will be promoted as a means of nature conservation and to provide alternate sources of livelihood.

#### Climate Mitigation and Adaptation

National Development Foundation, NDF aims to focus on various climate mitigation and adaptation strategies for reducing the impacts of climate change. It will be achieved by organising focused awareness programmes on the latest climate adaptation and mitigation strategies communities through Himalayan watershed development and tree planting drives, as well as by promoting The environmentally sustainable practices. demonstration environment-friendly pilot projects and policies and advocacy with the government to strengthen environmental policies and frameworks will be key areas of our work. The main focus of the NDF's climate adaptation and mitigation programme is creating awareness among a wide range of stakeholders about conserving nature and natural resources in their immediate vicinity. Healthy natural ecosystems will be promoted as a natural solution to deal with Climate Change at a regional level. Sustainable agricultural practices will also be promoted as a likely climate adaptation and mitigation strategy.

#### Water and Wetlands

National Development Foundation, NDF aims to document wetlands and wetland biodiversity of Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh through onthe- ground research and citizen science initiatives. To achieve this, the NDF will focus on developing strategies for conserving protected areas, especially National Parks, Wildlife Sanctuaries, and Wetland Conservation Reserves of Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh. The programme will also focus on developing an alternate model for conservation within and outside protected areas. One of the key components of this programme will be biodiversity monitoring and conservation planning. This activity will generate knowledge through applied research and outreach activities. The programme aims to improve the management of biodiversity and ecosystems through various outputs to influence existing policies and conservation planning.

#### Snow Leopard Programme

Snow Leopard Panthera uncia, the smallest member of the genus Panthera, is the most elusive cat inhabiting the cold and rugged mountain landscapes of the Great and Trans Himalayas in the western Himalayas. Its secretive behaviour, camouflage, and adaptation to extreme environmental conditions make it one of the most charismatic species in the world. At NDF, we have embarked on a comprehensive research and conservation initiative with support from the Department of Wildlife Protection and the Government of J&K. This programme has a special focus on protecting the snow leopard and its fragile habitats. NDF is the first organisation which has reported snow leopards in Kishtwar High Altitude National Park J&K.

#### **Annual Report**

#### 2024 - 25 Overview

In 2024-25, the National Development Foundation worked on strengthening child protection mechanisms in Jammu and Kashmir. The NDF and other child protection stakeholders collaboratively addressed critical gaps in the child protection system by establishing a three-tier Child Welfare and Protection Committee at the District, Block, and Village levels. Their focus was on capacity building, community engagement, and creating child-friendly spaces. Training programmes for police officers, JJB, CWC, and DCPU officials improved their understanding of child rights and protection, resulting in increased confidence in service delivery. The formation of Block Level and Village Level Child Welfare and Protection Committees encouraged community ownership and participation. Additionally, efforts included strengthening Child-Friendly Policing and establishing mechanisms under the Juvenile Justice Act.

In the education sector, NDF focused on strengthening early childhood care and education, foundational literacy and numeracy, parent-teacher engagement, early identification of disabilities, and early warning systems for students at risk of dropping out, as outlined in the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020.

The first-ever research project of the Kishtwar High Altitude National Park and the key Wildlife Programme, namely the Snow Leopard Conservation Programme, gained momentum in 2024-25.

#### **Education**

The NationalDevelopment Foundation (NDF) successfully implemented a comprehensive programme focused on strengthening Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE), Foundational Learning and Numeracy (FLN), and initiatives for Out-of-School Children (OOSC) in Jammu and Kashmir. This effort addressedcritical gaps in the education system and had a notable impact on the lives of young children. The National Development Foundation (NDF) works across ten targeted schools in Jammu. The programme emphasised localised Early Warning Systems, supporting the integration of Out-of-School Children, piloting early disability detection, and building capacity for effective FLN implementation in schools.



The main focus is on providing children with a strong foundation during their formative years, ensuring their holistic development in a child-friendly environment.



#### **Key Areas**

The National Development Foundation (NDF) works across ten targeted schools in Jammu and Samba. NDF's focus is on providing children with a strong foundation during their formative years, ensuring their holistic development in a child-friendly environment.



#### **School Readiness Camps**

The camps aimed to support children's smooth transition from early childhood education to formal schooling by enhancing foundational skills, emotional development, and parent-teacher collaboration. They also aimed to build school readiness through engaging, child-friendly, and inclusive learning practices.



The initiative significantly improved school preparedness among children increased the active involvement of parents and teachers in early education and strengthened community ownership.



#### Parent-Teacher Meetings

These meetings enhanced parent-teacher communication, improved parental involvement in students' education, introduced low-cost learning methods at home, and built stronger school-family partnerships, leading to a more supportive learning environment for children.

## Equitable and Inclusive Education with a Focus on Early Identification of Disabilities

The interaction with education leaders and managers helped them understand how to identify early signs of disability in young children. It promoted better teamwork between schools, doctors, and NGOs. Attendees gained valuable knowledge on creating more inclusive classrooms and learned about ongoing government initiatives. It also highlighted the importance of improved facilities and regular teacher training to ensure no child is left behind.

It encourages equal learning opportunities for all children, especially those with developmental delays or disabilities, by training teachers and stakeholders in early identification and support strategies.



### ECCE Leadership with Education Functionaries

These programmes provided education leaders with practical tools and ideas to enhance early learning in their schools. They helped them better understand ECCE goals and how to plan, monitor, and support quality education for young children. The session promoted teamwork, long-term planning, and highlighted the importance of strong leadership in making early education more effective and impactful inclusive.

## Teacher Capacitated on Early Warning System

The teacher's training emphasises how to spot warning signs—such as low attendance, poor performance, or emotional distress—and respond quickly. The training encouraged teamwork between teachers, counsellors, and parents to support at-risk students. This helped build a strong, school-based system to prevent dropouts and ensure more students stay in school and succeed.

To train teachers in identifying students at risk of dropping out and provide them with strategies for early and effective intervention to prevent droputs.

#### **Child Protection**

Significant progress was made in strengthening child protection mechanisms. Key achievements include the formation and reactivation of Child Welfare and Protection Committees (CWPCs), training of diverse stakeholders on child welfare, establishing a Child-Friendly Police Station, and conducting child rights camps that sensitised approximately 19,000 community members. The project also secured a central government commitment to support children facing adversity and highlighted critical knowledge gaps regarding alternative care mechanisms, as well as the need for sustainability through ongoing efforts.

Capacity building and active community engagement have become vital in empowering stakeholders to recognise and tackle child protection concerns. Bridging knowledge gaps about alternative care ensures children get proper support, while child-friendly spaces are crucial in establishing safe environments. Sustainability depends on consistent effort, resources, and long-term involvement. Finally, adaptability, innovation, and community-driven solutions are essential for addressing changing child protection challenges effectively.

## Formation of Child Friendly Police Station at Rajouri

The Child-Friendly Police Station in Rajouri, was established by the National Development Foundation (NDF) in collaboration with J&K Police and supported by UNICEF.



This initiative offers a safe and supportive environment for children to report abuse or seek assistance. With child-friendly facilities and trained officers, it carefully addresses children's needs. By fostering trust between police and the community, it enhances child protection and promotes a rights-based approach to law enforcement.

## Community Mobilisation on Child Rights and Child Protection

Community mobilisation awareness camps focusing on child rights and strengthening the three-tier child protection mechanism in targeted villages were held. Around 100 women, youth, and children from each village participated in the camps, which aimed to educate the community on child rights, emphasising the importance of protection mechanisms and the prevention of abuse, harm, and exploitation.



Such initiatives support early intervention measures and foster child-friendly awareness to protect children's well-being.

## Involving Children, Adolescents & Youth in College/Schools to promote Child Protection

Involving children, adolescents, and youth, NDF organised symposiums at various colleges and schools in Jammu and Rajouri districts focused on child rights, aimed at raising awareness and fostering dialogue among different stakeholders. Each symposium brought together educators, local leaders, parents, and child rights advocates to discuss critical issues affecting children in the community.



The Symposiums also highlighted the role of legislation and local policies in safeguarding children's welfare. By empowering attendees with knowledge and tools, NDF aims to cultivate a community-wide commitment to uphold advocate for the rights children, ensuring that their voices are amplified and their needs are met. The culmination of these events not only fosters a deeper understanding of child rights but also strengthens collaborative efforts to create a more protective environment for children in the region.



## Strengthening the Child Protection Mechanism at Block and Village-Level Through Block and Village Level Child Welfare & Protection Committees

The orientation of Block and village-level Child welfare and protection committees lays a strong foundation for child protection and serves as an important link with district-level Child welfare and protection committees. On the Pilot Bases, NDF has demonstrated this in five border villages of Nowshera: **Ganya, Chowki Handan, Bhajnowa, Bhawani and Hanjana Thakra and the border block Nowshera**. The programme saw active involvement from members of both the Block and Village Level Child Welfare and Protection Committees. These committees play a crucial role in safeguarding children's rights and ensuring their well-being within the community.

The primary objective of these trainings was to build capacity of the committee. equipping comprehensive, practical effective Juvenile skills members them knowledge necessary for Implementation of the Justice, Care by with and the Protection of Children Act. Committees were sensitised to the key provisions of the Act, their roles and responsibilities under the protection system, the child and the importance of intervention timely and coordination with stakeholders such as the police. & Protection Child Welfare Committees.





# Research Project i.e. Preparation of PRI-based geo-referenced biodiversity assessment, documentation and conservation plan of wild flora and fauna of Kishtwar High Altitude National Park (KHANP)

National Development Foundation continued working on a prestigious project, namely preparing a PRI-based georeferenced biodiversity assessment, documentation, and conservation plan for the wild flora and fauna of Kishtwar High Altitude National Park (KHANP). The project is in partnership with the consortium partners:

The project's primary objective is to document and assess the park's biodiversity, contributing to our understanding of the unique ecosystems thriving in high-altitude regions. NDF has submitted reports to the Department of Wildlife Protection, which are appreciated on record by the Hon'ble LG of J&K, among other senior officers

The NDF research team is focusing on the following aspects of the Kishtwar High Altitude National Park, as outlined below.

- Bird Diversity Assessment: The project focuses on identifying and documenting the avian species present within the national park. Bird surveys, including point counts, transects, and mist netting, are being conducted to record species diversity, population sizes and migratory patterns. The collected data will contribute to understanding the park's role in avian conservation and migration.
- Mammal Species Inventory: The research project aims to establish
  a comprehensive inventory of mammalian species inhabiting the
  Kishtwar High Altitude National Park. Field surveys, camera
  trapping, and DNA analysis techniques are being employed to
  identify and document mammal species, their population densities
  and habitat preferences.

- Flora Composition and Distribution: The study involves comprehensive vegetation surveys across different habitats within the park. Botanical techniques such as transect sampling, quadrat analysis and species identification are being utilised to determine the diversity, distribution and abundance of plant species. The collected data will aid in understanding the park's ecological processes, plant community dynamics and potential threats to vegetation.
- Insect Biodiversity Assessment: The project includes an assessment of insect biodiversity within the park. Various sampling techniques, such as sweep netting, pitfall traps, and light trapping, are employed to capture and identify insect species. This research will contribute to knowledge of insect communities, their ecological roles and potential indicators of environmental change.
- Conservation implications of Kishtwar Project: Presently, the field research team based at the research station at Loharna in the Dacchan area of Kishtwar is collecting all the research data. This collected data will undergo rigorous analysis to determine species richness, abundance, and diversity indices. Statistical models and Geographic Information Systems (GIS) will be utilised to understand the spatial distribution patterns of the studied taxa. The research findings will provide valuable insights into the ecological health of the Kishtwar High Altitude National Park and will aid in formulating conservation strategies to safeguard its biodiversity. The final DPR of the project will have all the information about various ecological aspects of the park and will have specific recommendations for the conservation and management of the park.
- Education, Awareness and Capacity Building: Simultaneously, along with research in the park, in order to build capacity for the future, the field researchers regularly visit the local educational institutions and conduct various education and awareness programmes related to the wildlife of Kishtwar High Altitude National Park. In order to build the capacity of the frontline staff of the National Park, the local staff actively participates in various research activities being conducted in the area. This will ensure the future sustainability of the ongoing research activities at Kishtwar High Altitude National Park.

#### **Snow Leopard Conservation Programme**

Snow Leopard Panthera uncia, the smallest member of the genus Panthera, is the most elusive cat inhabiting cold and rugged mountain landscapes of the Great and Trans Himalayas in the western Himalayas. Its secretive behaviour, camouflage, and adaption to extreme environmental conditions make it one of the most charismatic species in the world. The snow leopard is found across the high mountains of twelve countries in South and Central Asia, and India has the third largest share of the snow leopard distribution range. In India, the snow leopard is found in the Union territories of Ladakh and Jammu & Kashmir, the states of Uttarakhand and Himachal Pradesh in the Western Himalayas and the states of Arunachal Pradesh and Sikkim in the Eastern Himalayas. However, currently, the species is facing various threats, such as habitat loss, poaching and human-wildlife conflict.

Through our snow leopard research and conservation programme, the National Development Foundation (NDF) is dedicated to safeguarding the snow leopard population and preserving their unique habitat in the Himalayan landscape.

At NDF, we have embarked on a comprehensive research and conservation initiative with support from the Department of Wildlife Protection and the Government of J&K. This programme has a special focus on protecting the snow leopard and its fragile habitats. Currently, our programme is focusing on the following key areas:

#### • Research:

As part of our research activities for snow leopards, we conduct extensive field research to understand the behaviour, ecology and population dynamics of snow leopards at Kishtwar High Altitude National Park. Through camera trapping, satellite tracking, and genetic analysis, we gather crucial data to inform our conservation strategies.

#### Community Engagement:

We recognise the importance of involving local communities in conservation efforts. Therefore, NDF community experts work closely with villagers, herders and other stakeholders to raise awareness about the importance of snow leopards and mitigate human-wildlife conflicts through innovative solutions.

#### Habitat Protection:

Preserving the snow leopard's habitat is essential for their long-term survival. We collaborate with government agencies and local authorities to implement land-use planning measures and promote sustainable land management practices.

#### • Capacity Building:

We train local researchers, conservationists and wildlife officials to enhance their skills in snow leopard monitoring, research techniques and community outreach. By empowering local stakeholders, we ensure the sustainability of our conservation efforts.

#### Advocacy and Policy:

We advocate for stronger legal protection and policies to safeguard snow leopards and their habitat. Through partnerships with national and international organisations, we strive to influence policy decisions and secure funding for conservation initiatives.

#### **Our impact:**

Since the inception of our project, we have made significant progress in snow leopard conservation in Jammu & Kashmir. Our field team at Kishtwar High Altitude National Park is the first to provide photographic evidence about the presence of snow leopards in the area. Currently, this project is being implemented in partnership with the Department of Wildlife Protection and the Government of J&K. At the same time, by collaborating with local communities and universities, we have increased awareness about the importance of preserving this iconic species.

#### Scientific Reports under the Kishtwar High Altitude National Park Project

During the last reporting year, our organisation successfully completed and submitted 20 comprehensive scientific reports under the Kishtwar High Altitude National Park (KHANP) Research Project to the Department of Wildlife Protection, Government of Jammu & Kashmir. These reports collectively represent one of the most extensive and systematic scientific assessments ever undertaken in KHANP, covering species, habitats, ecological processes, and conservation challenges.

Each report was subjected to rigorous scrutiny by the Technical Review Committee of the Department of Wildlife Protection. The Committee's detailed comments, observations, and recommendations were duly incorporated into the revised versions of all reports, which were subsequently resubmitted to the Department, thereby ensuring that the outputs are of the highest scientific and management relevance.

The finalized reports cover the following 20 thematic components of KHANP:

- Survey and documentation (occurrence, occupancy, and density) of Hangul, Snow Leopard, Brown Bear, Black Bear, Musk Deer, Himalayan Tahr, and other large mammals.
- Survey and documentation (occurrence, occupancy, and density) of pheasants, vultures, and other avifauna, with emphasis on their ecological significance.
- Study and documentation of the Hangul corridor connecting Kashmir and Himachal Pradesh.
- Assessment and mitigation strategies for human-wild animal conflict in and around KHANP.
- Evaluation of the impact of livestock grazing on the KHANP landscape and its wildlife.
- GIS-based land use and ecosystem resource mapping.
- Survey and documentation of butterflies and other insect populations.
- Survey and documentation of flora, grazing resources, and medicinal plants, along with their ecological importance.
- Survey and documentation of aquatic flora and fauna and assessment of their ecological significance.
- Study of the sociology of nomadism and its impact on rangelands and the KHANP landscape.
- Pest and disease monitoring in the wildlife of KHANP.
- Study and documentation of ecosystem services provided by KHANP.
- Study and documentation of climate change impacts on KHANP ecology, along with adaptation and mitigation planning.
- Survey and documentation of biodiversity micro-hotspots and preparation of species-specific conservation and revival plans.

- Assessment and recommendation of infrastructure requirements for frontline staff, including guard huts, check posts, and offices.
- Assessment and recommendation of technological interventions for biodiversity conservation and management, and capacity building of frontline staff.
- Assessment and recommendation for promotion of environmental awareness in and around KHANP.
- Assessment, evaluation, and integration of ongoing conservation and management interventions.
- Study and documentation of discharge patterns of important streams/nallahs and watersheds within KHANP.
- Survey and documentation of aquatic biodiversity and evaluation of ecosystem health indicators in KHANP.

The breadth and depth of these reports provide a comprehensive scientific baseline for guiding the long-term conservation, management, and sustainable use of the unique ecosystems and biodiversity of KHANP. Together, they also highlight the ecological, social, and climatic dimensions of conservation in one of the most critical high-altitude landscapes of the Western Himalayas.

Importantly, the outputs of this research project now form part of a Detailed Project Report (DPR) for Kishtwar High Altitude National Park. This DPR will serve as a blueprint for the Department of Wildlife Protection in designing and implementing future conservation actions in KHANP. It will help the department in prioritizing interventions, addressing site-specific challenges, strengthening protection measures, enhancing community engagement, and planning climate-resilient strategies for long-term ecological security of the park.

With the submission and acceptance of these 20 reports and the DPR, the prestigious Kishtwar High Altitude National Park Research Project stands successfully completed, laying a strong scientific and management foundation for the park's future.
